Letters to Little Words

is the first program in the Pine Hollow Language Arts Series **36-WEEK PROGRAM**


Letters to Little Words is designed for students who are showing interest in reading, or who have learned some or all alphabet names, and are ready to begin learning the phonics sounds for all of the letters in the alphabet.

By the end of this program, students will:

- know all the sounds for the 26 letters of the alphabet
- be decoding easy three- and four-letter words
- be able to write all of their letters
- have mastered many essential life skills
- have the opportunity to learn the phonograms below

These phonograms are repeated in depth in Syllables to Sentences, so you can decide whether it is right for your student to encounter them now or in the next program. The overlap provides opportunity for repetition and additional decoding practice.





Syllables to Sentences **18-WEEK PROGRAM**

For students who have mastered the basic phonics sounds and are starting or ready to begin reading threeletter words such as bat, pin, get, fun, or rod.

When they complete this program, students will be decoding, reading and spelling five- to sixletter words and reading short sentences.



Paragraphs to Pages **18-WEEK PROGRAM**

For students who have mastered the basic phonics sounds and are ready to add more difficult phonograms and spelling patterns.

When they complete this program, students will have read through 36 easy reading stories, increasing their decoding and reading fluency skills.



Stories to **Short Chapters 36-WEEK PROGRAM**

For students who are reading short paragraphs with some assistance. Students will read fun,

vocabulary-controlled stories, play games, and develop their spelling and vocabulary skills.

When they complete this program, students will have read through 36 easy reading stories to increase fluency skills.



Readers to Real Books

36-WEEK PROGRAM

For students who ready to read, or just reading short chapter books. They will progress throughout the year to be ready to read any middle grade book.

When they complete this program, students will have gained reading comprehension and reading speed to become fluent readers.

HOW WILL PINE HOLLOW PHONICS BENEFIT YOUR STUDENT?

How We Create Confident Readers



WE INTRODUCE MULTIPLE SOUNDS

Students learn all of the sounds of a letter or phonogram at once, encouraging students to try sounds as they decode, and accelerating reading.

How This Benefits the Student:

- Reduces confusion by introducing all the sounds at once, rather than over a period of time
- Encourages actively trying sounds to decode
- Builds decoding confidence



WE TEACH MULTIPLE-LETTER PHONOGRAMS

Students will learn sounds for multiple-letter phonograms such as "dge" or "ai" or "igh." These additional phonograms provide a broad and solid system of sounds available for decoding.

How This Benefits the Student:

- Phonograms promote amazing spelling skills
- The phonograms build faster decoding / reading speeds
- Phonograms are more reliable for decoding than old-school rules that are broken more often than kept
- More difficult words can be broken into readable segments, such as kn igh t



STUDENTS SPEAK, WRITE & SEE

Students should be encouraged to speak the letter or phonogram as they write it, and as they create the letter on paper, they are seeing it.

How This Benefits the Student:

- Seeing, saying, writing all together accesses several of the intelligences of students (visual, auditory, bodily-kinesthetic)
- Offers better initial imprinting
- Supports easier learning retention



WE PROVIDE SMALL-LINED PAPER

Student handwriting sheets and workbooks are size-optimized to utilize fine motor skills. Overly large lines use major muscle groups, which thwarts the development of the correct skills.

How This Benefits the Student:

- Provides solid fine-motor practice from the very beginning
- Helps students train early in key letter formation skills
- Correct formation skills are honed when there is not a lot of room for error

NOTE! Some students may lag behind in their fine motor and handwriting skills.

Their struggle is not a lack of effort. Our small-lined paper will help students practice and develop fine motor skills. In the meantime, they may continue to develop their reading skills. Be patient as they develop these skills and take time for plenty of practice.






Introduce "Tatty's Dessert Plate" |

- Tatty the Mouse loves to bake, and she'll appear in later stories.
- Her dessert plate helps students create the circular form of many letters of the alphabet.
- Young learners often don't understand where to start circular letters just below the mid-line.
- The letter "a" is an excellent example.
- Young learners often don't understand where to start circular letters just below the mid-line.
- The donut hole is an easy visual that shows where to begin writing.



The habit of starting at the donut hole also lays the foundation for later success with cursive writing.






- 3 Students will learn to go around the rim of the plate in a counter-clockwise motion to create the letter.

The cookie helps students to learn where to start writing the letter "e," drawing a line to the right, then continuing around the circle!

To help students find the point at first, it may be helpful to draw dots just below the mid-line, about a letter width apart for them to start their letters.



The top of the rim of the plate is at the mid-line, and the bottom of the plate is on the base line.



Tell student what uppercase letters are for:

- √ first letter of names such as their name, and cities, streets, stores, etc.
- √ first letter of the first word of a sentence
- √ first letter of most words in a title of a book or poem or piece of art

DAY 2:

Learn the "A" Character Card |

- Repeat the Day 1 icon instructions again with your student
- Introduce the "A" Character Card, "Mac won an Acorn Award" to help your student remember:
 - √ that "a" makes three sounds
 - √ the order of the three sounds, present in the character's name in the correct order
 - √ the visual form of the letter is shown in the acorn award to prompt memory of correct letter formation

Why Is the Order of the Sounds Important?

The sounds on the phonogram and character cards are listed in order from most commonly used to least, to help students try the most common sound first when they are decoding a word.

Spell Your First Name | Guide your student in learning to spell their first name.

DAY 3:

Write Your First Name |

Guide your student as they practice writing their name. Use the reproducible handwriting pages from this guide.

DAY 4:

Hide and Seek "A's" |

While your student covers their eyes or goes into another room, hide the "a" card near or in an object that begins with "a." Then, give them some help finding it by going around the room pronouncing the names of possible hiding places that also begin with "a."

HOW TO TEACH LETTERS & PHONOGRAMS

Phonics Cards & Character Cards

Phonics cards teach letter and phonogram sounds, demonstrate letter formation, and are used with fun learning games.


Character cards demonstrate letter formation with pictures that solidify letter orientation for young learners.

Phonogram cards are at the center of learning to read in Pine Hollow.

The cards help enable word-building as soon as students learn letter sounds and included games keep the learning going in fun new ways each week!

The Reverse

Helps You Teach the Sounds

The sounds each letter or phonogram makes are shown with example words.

The Reverse Helps You Teach the Sounds

Pronunciation is shown, as well as directions on how to create the letter.



C

1st Sound , "hard" C as in <u>c</u>at

2nd Sound "soft" C as in city

Student says:

"c s

To form the letter c:

Start at the cookie on "Tatty's Dessert Plate" just below the mid-line and make a circle counter-clockwise, bringing the bottom of the letter to the base line. Bring the stroke up, but stop before completing the circle.

Character: Cranberry Cider

Card Name "Cranberry Cider" Says Two Sounds of "C"

The character card is also listed. Its words coordinate with the sounds the letter makes.

Since the letter c says "c" and "s," the character card name uses those sounds to help students recall the sounds!


Why Is the Order of the Sounds Important?

The sounds on the phonogram and character cards are listed in order from most commonly used to least, to help students try the most common sound first when they are decoding a word.

Picture shows the shape of the letter and card reverse provides an explanation of the words pictured, such as "Cranberry Cider."





Character cards include shapes that let students "see" letters in pictures, to help them write them correctly.








