Chirp imagined the wolf pack running through the woods. Chirp hoped that the wolves hadn't returned.





Chirp and Sir Finch were sure the creature was hidden behind a pile of rocks and boulders. Sir Finch led the way.


The two birds landed on top of the pile of boulders. At the base of the pile was a small gray bundle of fur and ears. It was curled up into a small ball.

The Articles "A" and "An"

The words "a" and "an" are articles. These articles are used before a noun that is singular. The word "singular" means means only one of something. The "a" article is used in front of nouns beginning with a consonant sound.

The article "an" is used in front of nouns beginning or making a vowel sound. Sometimes a word will start with a consonant but the consonant isn't said and a vowel sound is said first. The word "hour" is one of those words. The article "an" would be used before this noun even though it begins with the letter "h."

Here are some samples of what you've just learned: Scoot found \underline{a} leaf.

Dash saw <u>an</u> egg. Dash was hungry <u>an</u> hour before lunch.


A Helpless Wolf Pup

Sir Finch jumped into the air. "We're leaving, Chirp!"


Chirp didn't move. She looked at the cheerful wolf pup. The wolf pup tried to stand but he fell down again and again. Sir Finch was getting very impatient!


"Well, if the wolf pup is hurt, I have to help."

Plurals

So far you've learned that to make words plural you add "s." If a word ends with the letters "s," "x," "z," "sh," or "ch" add the letters "es" to make it plural. This week you will learn how to make words that end with "o," "f," "fe," and "y" plural. Listed below are the rules for making words plural. Read them and complete the exercise below.

Words that End with "y"

When a word ends with the letter "y" and has a consonant before it, we change the "y" to an "i" and add an "es." If the word ends in a "y" but a vowel letter is before the "y", simply add the letter "s" to the word.

Words that End with "f" or "fe"

To make a word that ends with either an "f" or "fe" plural, remove the "f" or "fe" and insert the letter "v" and add "es." Some words disobey this rule: belief and chief. These words only need to add an "s" to make them plural.

Words that End with "o"

To make a word that ends with an "o" plural, add the letter "s." Some words disobey this rule: hero, potato, tomato, buffalo, and tornado. These words need "es" added to make them plural.







"What do you want, thief?" Bandit asked.



"The ransom of three pies won't be enough!" Bandit added.





The Lewis and Clark Expedition

"That sounds like a fun story," Wormwood said.

"It is," Bert said. "I have to tell you a little about the expedition and the people who were on it first." He dug under Wormwood's bed for a book. It took several minutes but he found it. Bert quickly read it to himself. "Whittle, Wormwood, and Willow, you will need to know some things about Lewis and Clark before I tell you a story about them."





"The Lewis and Clark Expedition was a venture to explore the Missouri River and the land around it. The expedition was also to discover if the Colorado, Columbia, or any other river connected to the Pacific Ocean. The expedition needed to map out the areas they explored, meet native tribes, and see what natural resources the land offered. They also needed to find out if the land was a good place to live and settle.



"President Jefferson of the United States of America sent Lewis and Clark on this expedition. The explorers hoped that one of these westward flowing rivers would make it possible for boats and trade to go from the middle of the United States to the western part of the country and through to the Pacific Ocean.

"The leaders of the expedition were Meriwether Lewis and William Clark. The expedition had a total of thirty-three men. On May 14, 1804, the group of explorers left for the west.



"That year the men spent the winter at a fort they had built. They called it Fort Mandan. During that winter the group added two new people -- a fur trapper and his wife, Sacajawea. She was a Shoshone Indian. Sacajawea helped the explorers a lot. She was a guide and could speak the languages of the Indians.

"The explorers reached the Pacific Ocean and then returned east. The expedition ended September 23, 1806, lasting a little over two years. When the expedition returned, the men knew more about the land and the natural resources the land provided, they had made friends with some of the native tribes, and they had a better understanding of the geography of the American West," Bert finished.

Willow nodded and yawned. This story made her sleepy.




"It isn't making me sleepy, dad,"
